■ RABBI'S MESSAGE

RABBI STEVEN KANE

PROGRAMS OF EXCELLENCE

We begin the month of February with a very important program. With antisemitism becoming an increasing concern, the FJMC (Men's Club) has begun to promote programs to help us understand and respond to antisemitism. A committee of people met with a representative of the ADL looking for a speaker to inform us on how the rise in antisemitism is being confronted by the ADL, and what we can do to respond to it. In response to our request, Scott Richman, the ADL NY/NJ Regional Director will be speaking to us (and members of other synagogues we have invited to join us) on Zoom, Monday February 2nd, at 8:00 pm following minyan.

We are very fortunate to have Scott as our speaker. I have known him for many years from when he worked for the AJC in Westchester, and have heard him speak many times. You will find him both enlightening and engaging. There may not be a topic of greater urgency today, and we will hear from one of the experts in this field. Please join us on Zoom!

The Shabbat of March 13/14 will bring us Rahel Musleah as our Scholar in Residence. Rahel will be teaching us about the heritage of the Jews of India. Friday night will feature Kabbalat Shabbat with special Indian melodies followed by a Shabbat dinner with kosher Indian cuisine. After dinner Rahel, whose father was a rabbi in Calcutta, will speak on "Jewish Calcutta Through Music and Memory".

On Shabbat morning Rahel will introduce to us Indian customs for the Torah service, and will share with us her family's sefer Torah which dates from 1888. That morning she will also speak on "Recreating Community Through Prayer", comparing the Ashkenazi and Sephardi traditions of prayer and mysticism.

Following kiddish/lunch Rahel will speak on "From shipwrecks to Maharajas". This talk will trace the saga of lost tribes, shipwrecks and remote villages that comprise India's oldest Jewish communities. In addition Rahel will show us the unusual ritual of thanksgiving, the Malida, of the Bene Israel of India.

The word synagogue is from the Greek, meaning "to bring together". In Hebrew, we call a synagogue a bet kneset, a house of gathering. What that teaches us is that the primary function of a "Jewish house of worship" is not prayer, but community. In the coming months we have two important and unique opportunities to gather together as a community. I look forward to seeing you, whether on Zoom or in person.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

***The whole world is a narrow bridge
And the main thing is not to fear at all***

Rabbi Nachman of Breslov

A few years ago, Anna and I took a cruise to the British Isles, which included a stop at Belfast in Northern Ireland. Along the sea we walked to a place called the Giants' Causeway, a remarkable outcropping of hardened volcanic lava that looks as if it was a man-made brick walkway. From there, we climbed up to a chasm, a large split in the rock formations allowing the water to flow beneath it. And there it was: a narrow, primitive-looking, rope bridge that allowed you to cross over the chasm from one side to the other. Yes, it was shaky. Yes, it swayed a bit from side to side. Yes, those in front of us seemed to be hanging on for dear life with their heads tucked low against the fairly strong winds. Yet the scenic view was among the most beautiful that we had ever seen. At that moment we could either give in to our fear and cross the bridge or we could turn back. Of course, we crossed the bridge and are left with magnificent memories of the beautiful world that God created implanted in our brains. It was the literal enactment of Rabbi Nachman's words.

In a somewhat different vein, I watched the news the other night as I do pretty much every night. It doesn't matter what day it was, what news stories were addressed or even what station I was watching. Regardless of your political persuasion, the stories of war and international discord, the stories of mass killings, the stories of dysfunction in our own government where neither side can seem to work with the other, the natural disasters – floods, earthquakes, blizzards – all left me overwhelmed. What has become of our world? Where is there room for hope? Where is there a place for peace? Where is there a place for goodness? Is there room for a narrow bridge to take us to a better place?

In just a few weeks, we will celebrate Purim and re-tell the story of the Jews of Shushan whose very lives were threatened by a foolish and drunken king and his evil consort, Haman. Had there been broadcast news in those days, I suspect it would have been as dismal as our news is today. There did not seem to be a way out for the Jews, no narrow bridge to cross. Our High Holiday liturgy speaks of the "still, small voice" that calls out with hope and encouragement. In the Purim story, Esther was that still, small voice that spoke out, and in revealing her true identity as a Jew, saved her people from annihilation. Was she terrified? Undoubtedly. Yet still she spoke out and crossed that narrow bridge.

That brings us back to our world today. So many of us feel helpless. So many of us feel bereft. So many of us succumb to the aphorism "well what can I do?" The answer is that we all can do something. We all can bring a measure of goodness to this world. We all can help those in need, the elderly, the infirm and the needy. We all can make contributions to organizations that do good in this world in a manner that we can't as individuals. We all can write letters and e-mails expressing our opinions and rejecting that which we find repugnant. We all can vote – in every election. We all can face our fears, turning them into strength and courage that will allow us to cross that very narrow bridge. And we all have our own still, small voices that when sounded all together can turn into a giant roar heard all across the land.

■ PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

THE BEST AND WORST OF WHAT WE EXPERIENCE

I would guess that all of you have memorable trips—usually vacations, but possibly otherwise—that you will long remember. You may even recall the month and year of the trip, and any special circumstances. We're approaching the second anniversary of what may be for me the most memorable and moving of trips.

Before I reminisce a bit, it's appropriate to note the two events occurring at the end of January and early February. They remind us of the marked differences in the world in which we live.

The weekend of January 30-31 represents (or represented if your mailman walks slowly) the vigor and vitality of Judaism and the celebration of Shabbat. Tizmoret, the acclaimed A Capella group comprised of local college and grad students, joins us for the third consecutive year, performing during services Friday evening and Saturday morning, followed by concerts after dinner and kiddush lunch respectively. To see young people who want to sing the songs of our religion and heritage, despite often having to schlep to rehearsals boroughs away from where they reside, is encouraging. And the entire weekend is uplifting, to say the least.

Then a little reality sets in the Monday immediately afterwards. That's when we host the Zoom-based program with the NY/NJ regional director of the Anti-Defamation League. Why do we need to do this? Because as rosy and beautiful as the preceding Shabbat was, we Jews have a little problem. It's widespread and growing antisemitism...but you knew that. I suspect listening to Scott Richman may offer some encouragement as he describes what the ADL is doing to combat it and what we can contribute to the effort. But don't expect "uplifting." That's what you get on Tizmoret Shabbat, not from an ADL talk.

Which brings me back to the original topic: memorable trips. We've enjoyed many wonderful trips: driving throughout France in a 6-speed Mercedes with a French-speaking first lady or R&R trips or tourist-oriented activities. But none will be more memorable than the one on February 5, 2004, when Rhonnie and I met Anna and Eddie Edelstein in Israel on a post-October 7 solidarity mission. No need to review the itinerary of four jam-packed days (we still have the reports we filed daily and the Zoom briefing we did after returning as reminders). But what occurs to me, literally as I write this, is how that trip embodied the feelings—many times over—we'll derive from the Tizmoret and ADL events. The devastation we observed could be characterized as "beyond antisemitism," and classified as barbaric and pure hate. On the other hand, we observed the Israelis' commitment and spirit to continue on, to perpetuate the Jewish state and Judaism. Uplifting in the midst of disaster.

Memories of our participation in the solidarity mission to Israel and the upcoming Tizmoret and ADL remind us of the fragile balance between the highs and lows of the today's Jewish experience. I hope we'll see you at the two events Temple Beth El is holding.

HAPPY 100th BIRTHDAY HELEN POLLACK



Helen Pollack was born in Brooklyn, where she and her husband, Irving, built their early life and raised their three children. A lifelong educator, Helen taught in Brooklyn and later supervised a cooperative education program that prepared students for the working world. Education, curiosity, and civic engagement have always guided her path—she was a committed Zionist as early as junior high school and has visited Israel several times over the years. Her deep love of learning also led her to take evening classes with Marcia Hain Engle, driven by a desire to continually deepen her understanding of Judaism.

In 1973, Helen and Irving moved to Cedarhurst and joined Temple Beth El, a decision inspired by the warmth and character of its people. Their youngest son, Kurt, was Bar Mitzvahed here, and Irving went on to serve as president of the Minyan Society. Temple Beth El became a central part of their lives, where they formed lasting friendships and strong community ties. Helen became very active in the National Council of Jewish Women, where she and Irving launched a successful camping program, and she remains an active member of the National Yiddish Book Center. Now celebrating her 100th birthday, Helen is the proud mother of three children, grandmother of three, and great-grandmother of two - a remarkable life defined by education, Judaism, community involvement, and an enduring commitment to making the world richer for those around her.

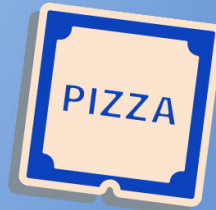

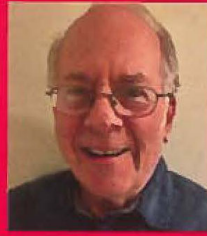
